The Orlin Corey Medallion Award honors recipients for their significant achievements for the enrichment of children in the United States and Canada through nurturing artistic work in theatre and the arts. The Award is named in honor of Orlin Corey for his thirty-four years of service and leadership on the board of the Childrens Theatre Foundation.



David Kilpatrick

David Kilpatrick is the Senior Director of Education Programs and Productions at The Kennedy Center in Washington, DC, where he oversees the Education Division's Music Education, Theater Education, and Dance Education portfolios, including school and family programming with the National Symphony Orchestra and Washington National Opera. From producing new work onstage for young audiences to behind-the-scenes presentations for all ages, and from career development programs for aspiring artists to 'try on' arts experiences for beginners, David works with the Education Programs and Productions team to support arts learning, both broad and deep, locally and nationally. Prior to his current role at the Center, David was the Manager of Theater for Young Audiences for nearly ten years, where he helped produce more than 25 world premiere commissions and supported the *New Visions/New Voices* new work development initiative. In addition, David has worked with The New Victory Theater, Walnut Street Theatre, taught for NYU's Study Abroad programs and directed for NYU's New Plays for Young Audiences.



Mireya Hepner

Mireya Hepner is a Theatre Producer and Founder of In Other People's Shoes Productions (a new TYA company). Mireya also teaches Theatre Management & Organizational Structure for USC School of Dramatic Arts. She has served for 35+ years in American theatre including 14 seasons as the Artistic Director of MainStreet Theatre Company (Rancho Cucamonga, CA/Lewis Family Playhouse) where she received acclaim for curating and collaborating on 40 AEA productions for young people and families. A veteran of professional and family theatre she has also worked for Parson's Nose Productions introducing classics to school kids, The Walt Disney Company developing touring shows for children, Radio City Productions, and numerous theatres in New York, Los Angeles, Regional Theatre, Off-Broadway and touring shows. Celebrating its 39 years in 2024, SEA's objective is to offer a real entertainment alternative, with cultural value and educational quality, for kids, the youth and adults through bilingual educational programs like workshops, seminars, theater and other cultural artistic expressions.

FORTS! Build Your Own Adventure began with the question, 'What if we created an environment where children's self-directed creative play was revered and supported and designed the way we would a piece of scripted theatre with professional adult performers?' Rethinking the hierarchy of whose creative impulse 'deserved' rigorous dramaturgy and attention from the best designers in Chicago led us to the work as it exists today. FORTS is both a play (the noun) and a play (the verb). Just like a play (noun), it's a carefully built and designed world, an emotional journey, an imaginatively designed story. But instead of watching the actors have all the fun, the audience gets to really, really play (verb).

FORTS! Build Your Own Adventure was commissioned and produced by Filament Theatre, a vital cultural anchor of Chicago's north side that imagines a world where young people are the experts and adults are allies working to build a just world. A sector leader in innovative new work development and international co-production models, Filament serves approximately 8500 patrons annually through theatre programming, camps, school residencies, and classes. Andrew Morton

Andrew Morton (he/him) is a Queer British immigrant, playwright, and theatre-maker known for his work in arts-integrated education and socially engaged performance. He lives in Detroit, where he works as a teaching artist and consultant with various arts and social service organizations and is the founding producing artistic collaborator at Every Soul Arts, which provides creative arts opportunities for young people experiencing homelessness. Morton's contributions to the arts and arts education have been recognized with multiple awards, including a 2020 Kresge Artist Fellowship from Kresge Arts in Detroit and the Kennedy Center Gold Medallion for excellence in theatre education. In 2024, he was named one of six Detroit theatre workers you should know by American Theatre Magazine. Morton's plays have been produced across the US and internationally in the UK, Australia, and Canada. His award-winning play Bloom, inspired by urban gardeners in Flint, Michigan, is available through Dramatic Publishing, Inc.
